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Bathroom Lighting Tip 1: **Understanding Bathroom Lighting Fundamentals**

Bathroom Lighting Tip 2: **Vanity Lighting Essentials**

Bathroom Lighting Tip 4: Illuminating With Wall Sconces

Placement	Eye-Level Installation	Mount sconces on either side of the mirror, about 28 to 30 inches apart and 65 to 70 inches from the floor, for balanced and flattering lighting.
Design Tips	Style and Finish	Choose finishes and shades that complement other fixtures. Frosted glass softens glare, while clear glass maximizes brightness. Adjustable arms offer directional light; fixed sconces provide a consistent look.

Bathroom Lighting Tip 6: **Pendant Lights: A Touch of Elegance**

Bathroom Lighting Tip 7: Chandeliers in Bathroom Design

Design Impact	A chandelier turns a bathroom into a showpiece, adding luxury and drama. It works best in larger bathrooms, serving as a centerpiece either above a soaking tub or centrally in the room. What are the three main types of bathroom lighting?	The three main types are ambient lighting (overall room illumination, usually from ceiling fixtures), task lighting (focused light for grooming, typically from vanity lights or sconces), and accent lighting (decorative or highlight light, often from recessed fixtures or small pendants). Layering all three creates a balanced, functional bathroom.

Do I need an electrician to install bathroom lighting near water?	Yes. Any fixture near a shower or tub should be installed by a licensed electrician to ensure correct moisture ratings, proper sealing, and code compliance under the National Electrical Code.
