Why Pest Prevention Starts With the Home Itself	Many pest issues begin outside due to cracks near the foundation, worn door sweeps, torn window screens, and damaged vents. Inside, pests are drawn to crumbs, leaks, and clutter, which provide food and shelter.	Seal gaps, improve drainage, and address structural vulnerabilities to limit pest entry points and indoor activity.
Integrated Pest Management in 2026	Integrated pest management (IPM) is a method of inspecting, identifying, preventing, monitoring, and acting when necessary, focusing on environmentally responsible solutions.	Address the conditions that support pests and use low-risk pesticide options only when required.
Quick Exterior Inspection	Cracks, gaps, and outdoor clutter create entry points for pests. Trim overhanging plants, remove standing water, and inspect areas near the foundation and utility openings.	Perform regular exterior inspections and maintenance to minimize access opportunities and discourage pests from entering.
Kitchen and Food Storage	Pests are attracted to food crumbs, grease, and open packaging. Pet food and spills also invite rodent and insect activity.	Store food in sealed containers, wipe surfaces thoroughly, and avoid leaving pet food out overnight.
Moisture-Prone Areas	Bathrooms, basements, and laundry areas can host pests due to moisture from leaks, slow drains, or damp fabrics.	Fix leaks, use exhaust fans, dry damp areas promptly, and consider using a dehumidifier in wet spaces.
Clutter and Storage	Clutter provides hiding spots for pests, making infestations harder to detect.	Use clear bins, elevate stored items, reduce cardboard, and conduct regular inspections for pest activity.

Yard Maintenance	Overgrown plants, debris, and poor drainage near the home create conducive environments for outdoor pests.	Trim vegetation, remove debris, and keep items stored outdoors clean and dry to reduce sheltered pest opportunities.
Pests and Pets	Pets can bring fleas and ticks indoors, spreading activity to people and household areas.	Check pets for fleas and ticks, wash bedding, and follow product instructions for flea prevention safely.
Early Warning Signs	Signs like droppings, egg cases, or damaged items often indicate pest presence or nesting areas.	Monitor the home for unusual signs and act quickly when repeated activity or damage occurs.
Monthly Pest-Prevention Routine	Breaking pest management into small weekly tasks makes prevention easier and more effective.	Inspect areas like doors, windows, kitchens, storage spaces, and yards on a rotating schedule.
