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Cabinet Design Tip 1: **Start with Workflow, Not Aesthetics**



Topic	Details	Design Considerations

Functional Kitchen Zones	Modern kitchens benefit from work zones dedicated to specific tasks, such as cooking, prepping, baking, drinks, and cleaning.	Design cabinetry around work zones to maximize functionality and ensure necessary tools and storage are located near their respective areas of use.
	Each zone organizes cabinetry and tools for accessibility and task-specific convenience.	
Practical Cabinet Efficiency	Wider cabinet boxes provide better functionality and reduce gaps compared to multiple smaller units.	Opt for fewer but wider cabinets when possible to maximize space efficiency and streamline cabinet design.

Cabinet Design Tip 2: Measuring Your Space Before You Do Anything Else



Category	Description	Key Measurements
Measuring Your Space	Before selecting cabinet styles or colors, map out your space with precision. Measure dimensions for walls, appliance locations, windows, doors, and architectural features such as columns, soffits, vents, and load-bearing walls. Errors at this stage can be expensive.	Measure each wall at multiple heights to account for uneven older constructions.
Standard Cabinet Dimensions	Kitchen cabinets follow consistent industry benchmarks for ease of installation and use. Dimensions vary by cabinet type and placement.	Base cabinets are 34.5 inches high without countertops and 24 inches deep, with widths ranging from 12 to 48 inches. Wall cabinets range from 12 to 42 inches high, 12 inches deep, and 12 to 36 inches wide. Tall cabinets stand 84 to 96 inches high.

Cabinet Design Tip 3: Map Your Storage and Usage Patterns

Cabinet Design Tip 6: Coordinate Color and Finish with Your Surroundings



Category	Description	Key Considerations
Coordinate Color and Finish	Cabinet color influences the feel, size, and visual harmony of the kitchen, impacting its relationship with other elements like countertops, flooring, and walls.	Consider natural and artificial light in the kitchen throughout the day before finalizing a finish. Evaluate finish samples under various lighting conditions in the actual space.
Light and Neutral Cabinets	White, off-white, light gray, and beige finishes make kitchens feel larger and brighter, reflecting light and providing a clean backdrop.	These cabinets require frequent cleaning, especially around handles and high-touch surfaces, to maintain their appearance.
Dark and Rich Tones	Finishes like deep navy, forest green, charcoal gray, and warm black add sophistication and hide daily use better than light finishes.	These tones work best in well-lit kitchens or with adequate artificial lighting to avoid a heavy or oppressive feel.
Two-Tone Approaches	Using a darker shade for lower cabinets with lighter upper cabinets or introducing a distinct color for an island increases visual interest without overwhelming the kitchen design.	This approach adds accents without requiring a full commitment to a single dominant tone.
Finish Sheen and Durability	Sheen levels, such as matte, satin, or semi-gloss, affect both the appearance and durability of cabinet finishes.	Matte is contemporary but harder to clean, satin offers a balance between cleanability and appearance, and semi-gloss is easy to clean but shows surface imperfections.

Cabinet Design Tip 7: Design the Interior for Daily Function
