Step Installation of Home Exterior Doors

Step	Description	Key Tips
Preparation	Measure the door opening (width, height, depth) and confirm the new door matches these dimensions.	Ensure tools like shims, a level, screws, sealant, and insulation are ready before starting.
Removing the Old Door	Carefully remove the old door and frame, paying attention to any surrounding materials needing repair.	Check for sub-floor or framing damage and address any issues to ensure stability.
