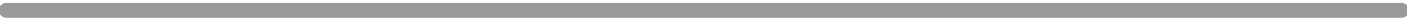

Start with an accent wall or a statement rug rather than a full renovation, and prioritize durable, easy-to-clean finishes so the room stays inviting through years of regular use.
